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


Community and Volunteer Services

Every year the community comes together to donate food, monies, and time to deliver Passover food to seniors and families in need. 661 individuals received Passover packages in 2016.

325 JFS volunteers provided 9,769 hours of service to JFS programs in 2016. Volunteers delivered 27,956 Kosher Meals on Wheels to recipients, educated 12,158 senior adults about Medicare fraud, waste, and abuse, helped in all senior programs, assisted in both agency offices, organized and packed food in the Kosher Food Pantry, and taught computer and citizenship classes.







There were 2,044 first-time intake calls to the agency. The intake desk handled requests for JFS services and provided referrals to outside organizations and agencies when appropriate.






To show appreciation for women's continuing efforts toward full equality, the JFS Women's Center hosted a get-together for women and children.

Counseling Services

Mrs. Z visited the JFS Women's Center after suddenly losing her husband of 26 years. Extremely depressed, having to leave her home, no life insurance and unable to pay her bills, Mrs. Z was referred to JFS counseling. A licensed clinical social worker helped Mrs. Z boost her confidence and self-esteem while giving her the coping mechanisms she needed to handle her grief. Mrs. Z received food from the food pantry. Mrs. Z was then able to work with the JFS Women's Center to obtain a full-time job to support herself and her family.


Senior Services

Services to Holocaust survivors allowed them to live independently and with dignity in their own homes. 186 survivors received Kosher Meals on Wheels, case management services, transportation, housekeeping, and medical and dental assistance. 70,666 hours of homecare services were provided to survivors that included skilled nursing care, and homecare aides.

Mr. B had been the primary caregiver for his wife for many years. Soon after his wife's death, Mr. B learned about the JFS senior nutrition program in Highland Park. He began to attend and soon discovered the benefits of participating in the group. He reported to the program staff that he felt a sense of calmness, well-being, and connection to the community. Though he missed his wife dearly, he developed friendships that continued outside of the program.


Immigration Services

277 students enrolled in JFS citizenship classes. 259 LPRs became U.S. citizens.

Miss C, an elderly, low income, Cuban LPR (Lawful Permanent Resident) attended JFS citizenship classes in Elizabeth. After a few months of classes, she submitted her N400 (citizenship application) with the help of JFS immigration staff. She was

approved for a fee waiver and passed her interview becoming a U.S. citizen. Miss C then motivated her son, daughter-in-law, and grandchildren to follow in her footsteps. The entire family enrolled in JFS citizenship classes and with JFS help, ultimately all became U.S. citizens.


IMMIGRANTS RECEIVING IMMIGRATION INFORMATION & ADVOCACY

Counseling Services

JFS is licensed by the State of NJ Departments of Human Services and Children and Families to provide behavioral healthcare and adoption services. JFS professional staff of licensed clinicians provides services to children, adolescents, adults, and families. JFS maintains contracts with many health insurance plans.

Immigration Services

JFS provides immigration services to assist immigrants and refugees from all over the world. JFS is US government-certified to represent and advocate on behalf of immigrants in matters brought before US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS).

- Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) SMP of New Jersey is part of the national SMP network funded by the US Administration on Aging. SMPs educate Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries, family members, and caregivers about preventing, detecting, and reporting health care fraud, waste, and abuse.
- State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), a statewide program sponsored by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services, Division of Aging and Community Services provides free, objective, confidential help to Middlesex County Medicare beneficiaries who have problems with, or questions about Medicare.
- JRecovery, a Jewish self-help group, supports recovery from various addictions using spiritual insights from Jewish tradition.
- JFS On The Road participates in community events to foster awareness of agency services.
- JFS responds to disasters and critical incidents in schools, the workplace, and the community.

Volunteer Services

Volunteers are an integral part of the JFS team. Dedicated individuals contribute their unique talents, skills, and knowledge to impact the community. Volunteers are connected to a vital role in the agency resulting in a positive and enriching experience for both volunteers and clients.

 Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) grant from Senior Corps, a program of the Corporation for National and Community Service, the federal agency for volunteering, service, and civic engagement. CNCS engages millions of Americans in citizen service through its Senior Corps program and leads the nation's volunteer and service efforts. JFS matches RSVP volunteers aged 55+ to opportunities within JFS or other Middlesex County community venues.
